The year that was 2018

As 2018 draws swiftly to a close, let's take a look back at the highlights of the year as well as some of the more challenging times. Happily, the former well & truly outnumber the latter.

The year began with record numbers attending the Lake Boondooma Yellowbelly Fishing Competition in February. This was followed in March by the spectacular 60th Proston Show. April saw a wonderful QCWA Easter Parade combined with Proston's first ever Regatta in the Park, which was very successful and great fun. Also in April, record numbers of horses and riders competed in the Golden Spurs Campdraft over 3 days. May saw the first of 2 outdoor movie nights and a big crowd gathered in Railway Park to watch "The Man from Snowy River".

With the closure of the Newsagency in Blake Street, it became apparent that help would be needed to keep our business district alive. Meetings were held to "Re-invent Proston" and this group has now formed Proston Qld Ltd, a registered company whose aim is to re-invigorate the main street.

We were all encouraged to spring clean our health in September with a wonderful Healthy Living Forum focussing on Diabetes. Mapleton Men's Shed also visited and assisted with renovations at the Golf Club and worked on a mobility assisted track in Reinke Scrub.

A Heritage Association has been formed and members are hoping to establish a museum and are looking towards Proston's Centenary Celebrations in 2023.



On the down side, huge numbers of little red flying foxes have made life unpleasant for residents living close to the colony at the top end of Beresford Street. We hope they move on soon!

Our town is as good as we choose to make it and we are lucky to have so many residents who give so much of their time, energy and passion to make Proston a great place to live. The small red flying foxes are a big problem for the Proston community. This particular red one has been known to move when the local food source is gone. We are looking at every possible option to deal with them including providing advice on health risks for humans and horses. We are working on a management plan including ways to relocate them. The main health message is don't handle a live flying fox. Their saliva carries disease so

everyone is warned to never pick up or handle a flying fox even if it is trapped in a fence. If there are any issues around dealing with one that is dead or alive please contact Council on 41899100.





Those were the days...

THE PICTURES

In Proston during the 1940s and 1950s, "going to the pictures" was a popular pastime. Saturday night was picture night and it was always an enjoyable night. If there was not a dance on, the theatre would be packed. Admission prices during this period increased from about 1/6d (15 cents) to 4 shillings (40 cents) for adults and 6d. (5 cents) to 2 shillings (20 cents) for school kids and the littlies were allowed in for free. The children always sat "down the front", cheering and laughing at anything and everything. It would only take one

cheer to set everyone else off, especially if there was a cowboy film on. "Hopalong Cassidy" was a favourite, as were the cartoons Donald Duck, Heckle & Jeckle, Tom & Jerry and Mickey Mouse. At interval patrons would go across the road to the café for an ice cream or some of their favourite lollies - the Jaffas. The theatre was quite large with canvas seats. There was a flight of steps, about 20, to the projection box. It would not be picture night if the film didn't break down leaving the hall in complete darkness. Sometimes it could be fixed quickly, other times the

lights were turned on and the patrons had to wait for a re-start. Special events were also held at the picture theatre.

In 1942, Mr Evans, the picture theatre proprietor, was asked by the Proston RSL to arrange a picture program as a Christmas treat for the children of those serving in the war. All children under the age of 16 years were admitted free. 50 pounds of shelled peanuts were received from the Peanut Board for the occasion (no allergies in those days apparently) and free ice cream, provided by the RSL, was available at the café. What a treat!
