Welcome Spring Rain

Beautiful Spring rain has fallen across much of the district during October. After a very dry start to Spring and higher than normal temperatures, the area was looking extremely dry. No rain was recorded at all for September and only 4.6mm for August, leading to a complete fire ban in late September.

October 1st finally saw a welcome change in the weather and regular, widespread falls of soaking rain and the odd storm continued throughout the month. The country has responded well as always and the landscape has been transformed from dry brown to lush green, lifting everyone's spirits.

Proston Post Office has recorded 148.4mm for the month, while approximately 210mm fell at Boondooma Homestead.

Local graziers are very happy and looking forward to an improved outlook for summer. Crop farmers will have ample moisture to plant summer crops such as sorghum, corn and mung beans.

Here's hoping the great season continues.

It is fantastic to see the beautiful rain fall on our region. We are an agricultural area and rain makes a huge difference to the outlook, for not only rural people, but it has a flow on effect to businesses and our general economy. Proston and also the town of Kingaroy rely heavily on the Boondooma Dam for their water supply. The Proston Rural Water Scheme is also sourced

from Boondooma Dam which is controlled by Sunwater. The town water across our region is charged on a tiered system to encourage water efficiency. Proston Rural Water is the only scheme in our region that works on a flat rate of charge. This is to support our rural producers and help keep the cost down as much as possible for them. Council is continually monitoring our water supply and we are participating in a water study through the

Wide Bay Burnett Regional Organisation of Councils, to identify any future shortfalls so that we can make sure we are water secure into the future.

In 1936 an attempt was made to form a Light Horse Troop. This was not successful. However in 1939, under the auspices of the Proston RSSAILA, a troop was formed. There were some 30 men who enlisted in Proston and the Headquarters of the Brigade were in Gympie.

There were certain conditions which applied, the most important being that the men had to supply their own horses. Men with the rank of Trooper were paid 5/- (shillings) per day, men of higher rank were paid more. The Government supplied the saddles, uniforms and other equipment.

The drill ground was near the entrance to the Proston Recreation Reserve and the Troopers attended camps at Maryborough, Caloundra and Beaudesert. The Proston residents always gave the men a hearty send-off at the railway station and on one occasion detonators were exploded on the railway line.

The Proston Light Horse Troop was disbanded after the end of World War 2.
