Who's Who in the Zoo?

It's a pleasure to feature one of Proston's legends in this edition of The Proston Post, our own Norm Smoothy. Norm was born in Wondai Hospital on 7 April 1933 and was the 4th child in a family of 8. His parents farmed at Abbeywood and Norm attended Abbeywood, Hivesville & Kinleymore schools, though school wasn't his favourite thing and he says he didn't learn much. After leaving school Norm worked on the family farm helping with the dairying and cropping. In 1953 he drove the Abbeywood/ Stalworth cream truck for a time before commencing National Service in 1954. Following this he worked as a truck driver, first for Denny Etherington, then Clive Latcham. He

recalled helping to cart 10,000 bags of corn from the Mearns property at Durong to the rail in Proston from where it was sent to Kelloggs in Sydney. Around 1959 Norm bought his first truck, a Dodge 8 ton, which he used for carting sleepers. With the addition of a tipper he was able to do private contract work carting gravel for the Wondai Shire. He also worked for a time around Moura and Duaringa as well as doing dozer work in the Durong area. In 1963 he purchased another truck, nicknamed "Girlie", which he kept until he retired. Norm said "It always feels good to come home to Proston. I know everyone and everyone knows me". We love you Norm!

Those were the days......

Maryborough Chronicle - 17/7/1923

PROSTON - THE TOWN'S PROGRESS – Since the completion of the Murgon-Proston railway things at Proston are looking up and already the place has the appearance of a thriving town.

Many allotments have been cleared for building purposes, the public hall is practically completed, Messrs Thorne & Walker have built a very nice general store while Messrs Parke & Company of Wondai have also built a commodious bulk store. The local opinion poll resulting strongly in favour of new licences has induced Mr Condren to build a hotel. The site is now cleared, and later tenders are to be called for the erection of the building.

Mr H Welch is building a shop and dwelling, and a small building has been erected for The Commercial Bank of Australia Ltd to transact business once a week (Tuesdays) until such time as the town warrants a permanent bank and manager. Mr GTM Boynton has made a contract with Mr HW Kratzmann of Murgon to build refreshment rooms, and will be in going order within a few weeks. All these places have sprung up in mushroom style, and with the erection of the butter factory in the near future, Proston, one must admit is really going ahead.

At present one thing that strikes the new comer to Proston as discouraging to business men is the entrance to the town by road. One can see the station only a few chains away but is compelled to practically circle the whole of the town allotments going some 30 chains out of his way to get to the station gate, while if the Council had cut the direct road, in which necessitated the expenditure of about £5 for clearing the road and £25 to bridge a small gully, the distance would only have been about 10 chains. If Proston is going to be a busy town, as assuredly it will be, councillors must see to it, and very soon, that a good and handy entrance is provided to the town. The public is sure to object to going all round "the mulberry bush" with loads of cotton, maize, cream and other produce.
